The Rt. Rev. Marty Stebbins, the 10th Bishop of Montana, will make her visitation to Holy Spirit Parish on Sunday, April 18. At the writing of this article, it is still to be determined whether or not we will be gathering in person (with protocols) or virtually as we have been doing, but we will get the word out about all the details around the time this *Paraclete* arrives in your mailboxes. As chief pastor and teacher of the diocese, Bishop Marty will preside and preach at the service that Sunday. Her presence connects us to Episcopalians beyond our walls, in Montana, in the Episcopal Church, in the Anglican Communion, and back through the Church's history. While most of us will only see her on Sunday, she will be working hard to learn more about Holy Spirit Episcopal Church by meeting with the Vestry and clergy, hearing and responding to their concerns and questions.

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From the Rector **Transitioning back to in-person gathering: Step 1 – Preparation**

The world around us is beginning to turn towards spring: the sun is shining, the birds are chirping, and people are outside more and more. After a year of the losses and challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic, we are thankful for vaccinations underway and gradual return to more in-person gatherings. All of us are ready for the pandemic to be behind us and to get on with something more normal: to physically gather for worship, fellowship, ministries of all kinds, and to see one another face to face. I know I do.

Time in the wilderness changes us. As much as we want to go back to what was, we know that we never really go back. We go forward with all that we've experienced, and our personal and communal stories are already full of new chapters and still more to unfold in the future. We need to prepare ourselves now so that when re-opening begins, we will be ready to support one another through the transition. It is going to feel different. How we shift from prerecorded services to live services with streaming capabilities will take some adjustment. For a time, there will be protocols in place: mask wearing (vaccination or not), social distancing of 6 feet or more, hand washing and sanitation, and regular cleaning of our buildings. Some activities will be done outdoors. The intention will remain as it

has been all along: to minimize the risk of giving Covid-19 to another while vaccination efforts move forward. We will be mindful of the most vulnerable in our midst, patient, respectful and known by our love shown to one another as we emerge from this long pilgrimage in the wilderness. And too, we will be prepared for the unknowns that may still be ahead, on-going changes sure to come, and taking on opportunities that we are afforded after all of our wandering with the Spirit of God.

The Staff of Holy Spirit has already begun needed preparations for our return. We prayerfully decided to keep worship services in a pre-recorded fashion through Easter, knowing that current protocols would still be in place limiting us to 50 total worshippers. Instead, we will continue our Lenten pilgrimage and year's long journey in the wilderness together, celebrating the Resurrection from wherever we may be as one body in Christ – a sacrament dispersed throughout the world. There are many more preparations underway. We ask that all of you take time to pray for our transition back to in-person gatherings and for the Spirit's guidance to continue as we go forward.

Things kids can do to take care of the earth:

1) Organize a litter drive with friends and family. Pick an area that you have noticed is particularly trashy. It's surprising how much litter you can find even just on a neighborhood walk.

2) Be prepared. Carry a grocery sack with you when you are outside enjoying nature. Then you're always ready to help clean up.

3) When you discard 6-pack rings, always snip them so no animal gets stuck in it. Better yet, don't use products that require a 6-pack ring.

4) For older kids, do a little research and find out how long litter lasts. How long does it take for these items to break down? A piece of paper, a wool sock, aluminum soda can, banana peel, disposable diaper, glass bottle, batteries, plastic bags, plastic soda bottle.

Creation Care Spirituality

Celtic Christianity has long emphasized our God-given goodness, and in the tradition of St. Patrick there is an awareness that all created things, carry within them the grace and goodness of God. St. Patrick's Breastplate hymn, in our 1982 hymnal, is unique in the way that it invokes the strength of God through the energies of the elements:

"I bind unto myself today The virtues of the star-lit heaven, The glorious sun's life-giving ray, The whiteness of the moon at even, The flashing of the lightning free, The whirling wind's tempestuous shocks, The stable earth, the deep salt sea,

Around the old eternal rocks."

The words of this hymn are so striking because they speak not just of the beauty of creation at a superficial level, but rather they make a more profound statement. St. Patrick's hymn implies that God exists within creation itself. And when we look to God for strength, we might access that strength through creation—a star-lit heaven, a ray of sun, the white moon, a flash of lightening, a whirling wind, the stable earth, a deep sea and old eternal rocks! It might sound strange to our theological ears, but I think as Montanans we know this experience; we carry this experience within us.

I think we know this on an intuitive level, if not an explicit one. We live in Montana. For many of us that has been an intentional choice. We are here because we value the beauty and the wide-open spaces. We're awed by the wild ruggedness of the Mission Mountains. We are soothed by the grandeur of Flathead Lake. We are filled with wonder when we spot a grizzly bear at Glacier. We breathe in peace as we cast a salmon fly on Rock Creek. We recognize that the whole world is the "house of God" and the whole thing is shot through with divinity. Celtic Christianity teaches that nature is a window to the divine, and creation is a sacred text in which the presence of God is revealed.

Our traditions and texts are full of imagery from nature. We are steeped in baptismal waters. A star from heaven led the way to baby Jesus. We think of

Jesus as the vine, and ourselves as the branches. There are countless images of sheep. We know the Holy Spirit as a dove, wind, and fire. We celebrate Communion with gifts from the earth: bread and wine. These are just a few examples.

Oswald Chambers writes,

Nature to a saint is sacramental. If we are children of God, we have a tremendous treasure in Nature. In every wind that blows, in every night and day of the year, in every sign of the sky, in every blossoming and in every withering of the earth, there is a real coming of God to us if we will simply use our starved imagination to realize it.

Container Gardening Workshop

1-3 pm in church courtyard Sunday, April 25

Container Gardening workshop planned for April 25

On April 25, the Sunday closest to Earth Day, the Creation Care Committee is putting together a Container Garden Workshop from 1-3 pm in the church courtvard. We'll have soil, compost, containers, seeds and plants (flowers and vegetables) all available for free, and members of the committee will be on hand to help you put them together. We'll also be on hand to help you with your own gardens, whether you are a newbie or have lots of experience and want to try something new. Whether you're interested in trying straw bale gardening, square foot garden or companion planting, we'll have someone to help you out.

We have two requests for things to save – one is clean gallon milk jugs (to keep your plants warm until June) and the other is styrofoam peanuts (the kind that don't dissolve in water; test a few by putting them in water for a few minutes) or pieces of packing styrofoam that can be cut up. These will make the bigger containers easier to move around. If you have favorite containers that you'd like to use, feel free to bring them along!

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Learn more about recycling...and recycling glass

In the February *Paraclete*, Tracey Gage asked that we "please help our world be a better place for our children, grandchildren, nieces, and nephews...to be able to breathe clean air, see glaciers, clean rivers and lakes, and to appreciate having clean water to drink."

Recycling is an especially important way that we all can contribute to this goal! First, recycling reduces trash; second, recycling reduces the energy and the CO2 emissions needed to produce whatever is being recycled; and third, recycling is something we can do! We don't have to run a company or start a new "green energy" operation or get involved in the politics of climate change. We just have to be conscientious and make the effort...recycling is, indeed, something we all can do!

Unfortunately, we have a lousy track record in the United States. According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the average person creates around four-and-a-half pounds of trash every day, or about 1.5 tons in a year! The EPA also estimates that of the solid waste people throw away, 75 percent of it is recyclable, even though only about 33 percent of it actually is recycled. We can do better!

Fortunately, here in Missoula there is a lot we can do about this gap between 75%

thrown away and 33% recycled. One specific example is glass!

Why Recycle Glass?

Put very simply, glass is virtually 100% recyclable and can be recycled endlessly without loss in quality or purity, and recycled glass can be substituted for up to 95% of raw materials used to make new glass. In addition, CO2 emissions are reduced by 5% for every 10% recycled glass, so there is a significant energy savings as well. And we have a lot of potential savings: US's roughly 33% glassrecycling rate pales in comparison to the 90% recycling rate in Switzerland, Germany, and other European countries.

How to Recycle Glass?

Fortunately, recycling glass is easy in Missoula and at Holy Spirit!

If you live within the Missoula city limits, one option is to contract the services of Recycling Works, which offers curbside pick-up. Recycling Works is a non-profit started by the Missoula Interfaith Collaborative, which Holy Spirit has supported since it began. They are the only option for

recycling glass in Missoula, and they have been doing a great job, growing recycling significantly in our community. You can get more information at

www.recyclingworksmt.org, including costs and pick-up schedules (which are monthly for residential recyclers).

However, as a parishioner at Holy Spirit, you have a second option: to join the Holy Spirit families who are already recycling glass through our own program. Our program started 18 months ago, with six families participating, and today we have more than doubled the number of families to 13. So...what are the benefits to using the Holy Spirit program, instead of working directly with Recycling Works?

- First, recycling with Holy Spirit is less expensive – \$6.30/month for whatever volume of glass you have, versus either \$9.95 or \$12.95/month depending on the size of container you need.
- Second, Holy Spirit glass is picked up biweekly instead

of monthly.

• Third, and most important, you join other Holy Spirit families in a community effort, an effort which is a small but important step toward making our community "a better place for our children, grandchildren, nieces, and nephews"!
