# A Festival Service of Nine Lessons and Carols

### Our celebration begins on December 20 Join us for Lessons and Carols

The Festival Service of Nine Lessons and Carols has been a wonderful part of our introduction to the Christmas Season for years and years, and the challenges of COVID are not going to keep us from celebrating, albeit in a new and different way. The beautiful carols and anthems that have become familiar to us over time will be heard again; Bishop Marty will again join us from Helena; singers and readers will participate from home, hearth, or the great outdoors.

The Festival Service of Nine Lessons and Carols, which began in England in the early 1900s, is now a part of Anglican and Episcopal worship throughout the world. The service is made up of lessons alternating with the singing of congregational and choral music. Beginning with the story of Adam and Eve, the lessons trace the prophecies of the Nativity and end with the beautiful passage from John: "In the Beginning was the Word...."

I invite all of you to join the choir on the 20<sup>th</sup>, and in the words of the beautiful opening prayer,

to hear again the message of the angels, and in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem and see this thing which is come to pass...

### Church School 2020 Advent: a time to start fresh and pay attention

It is always interesting to start the beginning of the church year as our calendar year is winding down. I guess I kind of like it. I like the way the church can jar us, setting our methodical paces on edge and calling us to look up and pay attention. I don't know about you, but this year in particular I'll take as many fresh starts and early starts and new beginnings as possible!

I love the way that the church year starts before the action. The new church year kicks off with four weeks of Advent, a time of quiet reflection and preparation for Jesus's birth. It's just so churchy, isn't it? We jump into the new lineup . . . by taking some quiet time to prepare—countercultural—deeply spiritual! I guess the church wants us to know that the quiet is part of the action.

What does this mean for 2020? Maybe you're sick of quiet time? Maybe you're exhausted and over extended? Maybe you're anxious and unsettled? Wherever you are in that gamut, it seems that Advent will not have the same hectic cultural pace pushing up against it this year. This does present an opportunity in a month that we have come to expect will be crazy-busy. The question is: can we use this time and space for our spiritual benefit?

This morning I remembered an article I read last year in the *Christian Century*. The author described reading Toni Morrison during the season of Advent. She described the way Morrison's novels call our attention to the margins, to vulnerable populations like shepherds and unwed mothers, and to the way her fiction speaks of mystery and blessing and the presence of God in ordinary life. The author wondered if the patient, attentive gaze of a novelist could inspire us to do our own deep observation during Advent. I am going to try it—reading a Morrison novel—over the next 4 weeks, and paying closer attention to life, the world around me, and God, surprisingly in the middle of it all.

This set me on a course this morning, wondering what others read during this time of year. I reached out to all kinds of churchy friends and colleagues. I asked: do you have a favorite read for Advent? Here are some of the books that were suggested, both traditional Advent devotions and non-traditional works of fiction, in case you want to check out one of these for your Advent reflection.

# Join us as we wrap up our 2020 Lenten series on Race and Faith

Our Lenten program was put on pause last spring when everything was shut down. We are using three Wednesday evenings in December to finish that series via Zoom. More details will be coming your way. For now, you'll want to get it on your calendar.

#### Wednesday December 2<sup>nd</sup> 7:00 – 8:30 pm via Zoom

The Montana Racial Equity Project, will present, *The Black (Non)Accrual of Wealth and Reparations*. This session will study the history and causes of Black-white racial wealth inequality and the call for reparations.

#### Wednesday December 9<sup>th</sup> 7:00 – 8:30 pm via Zoom

Professor Tobin Miller Shearer will present, *Formation: Anti-Racist Practice as Spiritual Discipline*. In this interactive session, we will work with a series of case studies to learn best practices for interrupting racism when we encounter it in our daily lives and interactions. The wisdom of the spiritual disciplines will guide our discussion.

#### Wednesday December 16<sup>th</sup> 7:00 – 8:30 pm via Zoom

U of M Professor David Beck, of the Native American Studies program, will present, Tribal Sovereignty and American Indian Religious Freedom. American Indian tribes have a unique political relationship with the United States due to their status as nations within a nation. Yet they continue to struggle to exert the "tribal sovereignty" that is theirs under law. At the same time, the United States claims to be a nation founded on the idea of religious liberty. Yet the first Americans have historically been denied the right to practice their religions, and this is also something with which they still struggle. This talk will look at the intertwining of tribal sovereignty and American Indian religious freedom.

While many of us may have been feeling confined to our homes during the COVID-19 pandemic, we also are ever grateful to have homes that we can be confined within. The Poverellos center, Missoula's shelter for homeless men and women, provides that safe haven for people without homes of their own. To support the wonderful work of the Pov, Holy Spirit Parish is again conducting a drive for socks, hats, gloves and scarves to be given to Missoula's homeless residents, who spend many hours out on the streets in the cold, wind and snow.

Our drive for winter apparel will not begin until the first week in January, but we wanted everyone to know that the collection is coming in order to begin buying or knitting or regifting these critical items. With church not scheduled to be back in session by early January, we shall be collecting these items in a bin on

the porch of Holy Spirit Parish and in bins on several covered porches of generous parishioners who live around the city. We shall publish those addresses in the *Spirited Times* as we get closer to the collection dates.

In the meantime, we appreciate any socks, hats, gloves and scarves you can donate. Please remember: socks should be made from wool or synthetic fabrics such as Thermolite. Please, NO cotton. Cotton does not keep out the cold and fails to wick away moisture, making feet feel cold and damp.

### Community Ministries Something's up at The Parenting Place!

When you pull up to the corner of 8th and Catlin these days, you will notice that something's up at The Parenting Place (PP)...the front entrance has been rebuilt, a taller privacy fence surrounds the play yard, and a Planet Kids sign has been added to the pole out front. PP now leases the main building for some hours each day to Planet Kids, a program of the YWCA that offers assistance in arranging continued contact between non-residential parents and their children, and provides a safe, comfortable, and confidential place for parents and children to build positive relationships. This kid-friendly location offers wonderful opportunities for this important service.

PP has also become a Kids Study Hub for neighborhood kids in third grade through high school Monday through Friday from 10AM to 3PM. Students can use laptops, get a snack or meal, and safely hang with their peers and caring adult mentors.

Parenting classes continue to safely support those in jail, the pre-release center, and across the community. What challenges COVID has brought have been met with nimble and thoughtful responses. We appreciate your prayers for the leadership, children, and families of PP, and know that any year-end gifts will put them on an even stronger and more responsive path for 2021. #### **A Family Resource**

Are you looking for spiritual formation practices to do at home with your children? Suddenly, parents and caregivers are on the hook for all sources of education and support, just when we may be feeling extra pressure in our work lives too. Consider this book I recently learned about, Candle Walk: A Bedtime Prayer to God, by Karen Holsinger Sherman. I love this book for four reasons. One, it's a picture book meant to be read at night before bed. You probably already read to your kids at night; slipping this book into the lineup is EASY. Two, it integrates the language of the Compline service from the Book of Common Prayer into daily life for a child. This is a powerful resource for any human, no matter the age. Three, I love the pictures and the little line drawings. Four, older children may be able to reflect on their day as you read this book with them. Here's an excerpt:

"Creak, creak, dance the trees. Our eyes are closed as we remember our day. Did God move through our branches today? Or did God's breath feel far away? Did someone seek the shelter of our shade? Is there something that made us sorry?"

I hope this book can help as you support your children and together build practices that can sustain them for a lifetime.
