


# Bishop Marty's Annual Visitation takes place on December 4



# Join us in person for Lessons and Carols

The Festival Service of Nine Lessons and Carols will take place on Sunday evening, December 18, at 7 p.m. in the church. The choir and organ will be in splendid voice, and the beautiful carols and anthems will be the perfect introduction to the last days before Christmas.

The Festival Service of Nine Lessons and Carols, which began in England in the early 1900s, is now a part of Anglican and Episcopal worship throughout the world. The service is made up of lessons alternating with the singing of congregational and choral music. Beginning with the story of Adam and Eve, the lessons trace the prophecies of the Nativity and end with the beautiful passage from John: "In the Beginning was the Word...."

to hear again the message of the angels, and in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem and see this thing which is come to pass...

# Christmas services are expanding this year!

It has been three years since we actually held in-person Christmas Services, and this year we will have offerings that we hope will help as many people to gather as possible. Last year we learned that there is a desire for an outdoor service that is designed simply with prayer, Communion, and caroling, concluded with the singing of Silent Night by candlelight all around the big Spruce tree in the courtyard. We will bring that into our worship schedule this Christmas Eve and will add a service of Morning Prayer on Christmas Sunday morning. The light of hope will brighten our courtyard every evening, Advent through Christmas, and maybe even into Epiphany!




## Check out the Advent devotionals by Sanctified Art that are new this year. These 17-page full color Advent






## St. Paul's Update

Here are a few updates about what is happening with your brothers and sisters at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Hamilton, MT.

- St. Paul's is working with Caleb Koebble from Montana Interfaith Power and Light to find practical ways to decrease their carbon footprint.
- They are working to keep their Little Free Pantry full of food donations during these cold winter months. The food pantry (similar to the Little Free Library idea) offers free food 24/7. It's on a honor system: take what you need, share what you can.
- In November Steve Oreskovich taught a class, God is in the World or Nowhere.
- St. Paul's is collaborating with other mainline churches in the Valley to offer an Advent service on Tuesday, December 13<sup>th</sup> at Corvallis United Methodist Church at 7 p.m.

Rev. Gretchen works half time at St. Paul's and half time at Holy Spirit. She is in Hamilton every other Sunday (and spends the night there twice a month). She is there every Monday and often works remotely on Tuesdays, doing St. Paul's work from home.

# Learn more about becoming a foster parent on December 6

Holy Spirit is working with Youth Homes' Dan Fox Family Care Program and our fellow Missoula Interfaith Collaborative congregations to encourage foster parenting consideration. We will host an informational session via Zoom on December 6 from 7-8PM for people to learn more about getting prepared and licensed for foster care.

The Dan Fox team works closely with the Department of Child and Family Services to provide services to kids in the foster care system. They focus on stable, long-term placements, in the hope of reunifying children with their biological family or adoption into their foster family. Potential foster parents are trained for therapeutic foster care to participate in a network of trauma-informed

therapy for children who have experienced neglect and abuse. Their next complete online foster parent and adoption training begins January 10.

Might full-time or respite foster care parenting be a possibility for your family or for a family you know? Please join us via Zoom on December 6, 7-8PM, to learn more; other dates and times for informational sessions are also available. To receive a Zoom link, please contact me. ## **Migrant Farmworkers in Montana**

At The Farm Workers Center, in a gritty part of El Paso, we learned that during World War II, five million Mexican workers were sprayed with DDT as they entered the US, then deported after the war. We heard about the hardships and indignities of workers' lives. As we listened, men quietly came and went, doing paperwork, using the computers and the showers.

Feeling strangely at home, I thought of the early days of Vet Centers, where Vietnam veterans alienated, down-and-out - gathered in gritty parts of town to apply for benefits they had earned and to talk about war, exposure to toxins, feeling discarded and scorned. Both veterans and migrant workers do dirty, dangerous, sometimes deadly work. Both feel misunderstood and unappreciated despite their vital contribution to society. Both experience sexual violence.

Montana is emerging as a migrant worker destination. Migrants love Montana for the same reasons everyone else does: natural beauty, fewer crowds, less crime, good education. They do jobs locals don't want. They face unique challenges: few Spanish speakers, little public transport, and the impossibility of blending in.

Migrant farm workers are vital to Montana's economy. In 2005, there were 48.300 workers: in 2017, there were 200,000, including Latinx cherry harvesters and Peruvian sheepherders. Also, Montana businesses recruit foreign workers and handle paperwork for farmers and ranchers. It is difficult to fill positions because the farm labor market is tightening due to social changes in Mexico. Employers could recruit and retain workers by providing benefits, bonuses, and improved workplaces and by educating supervisors regarding state and federal laws, especially around sexual violence and harassment.

Workers are looked after by The Migrant and Seasonal Farmworkers, a division of the Montana Department of Labor. Montana Migrant and Seasonal Farmworks Council (MMC) is a private organization dedicated to improving the lives of agricultural workers and others living in rural poverty. In March, National Farmworker Month, Holy Spirit participated in the Long-Sleeved Shirt Drive sponsored by National Farm Workers Jobs Program. Montana collected 2229 long-sleeved shirts for Flathead Cherry workers — more than any other state!
