

As we begin a new school year we are caught in the tension of trying to market a product (church) that many young adults have a negative impression of. Cook a meal: We offer two meals per week to our student group which are usually cooked by fellow students. Having a guest cook and participant is a welcomed gift!


Donate items to Oktoberfest: We are still collecting live and silent auction items for our October 23rd event.
