As we look back over this last year and try to forge ahead into a new one, we have decided to offer something quite different for our Lenten program in 2021. Why not? Everything else is still different. And it seems that these unsettling times call for a different response and new strategy. We ask you to consider participating in, "Life Transformed: The Way of Love in Lent."

This seven-session course will be

offered via Zoom. As a nod to doing something different, the program will be offered on Thursday evenings, rather than our standard Wednesday night Lenten programs. The Way of Love, as you likely know, is an initiative of our Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry. We will use and adapt the curriculum created by The Episcopal Church.

The Presiding Bishop worked with others to develop the Way of Love. The Way of Love is comprised of ancient practices, because there really is nothing new under the sun, for deepening a Jesus-centered life. The aim of the initiative is to assist Episcopalians as we live out Jesus' call to: Abide in me as I abide in you. (John 15:4)

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Our Lenten journey begins on Ash Wednesday, February 17

Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent, derives its name from the ancient practice of marking the foreheads of worshippers with ashes from the unused palm branches of the previous year. As the service for Ash Wednesday says:

Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

Join us on Ash Wednesday, February 17, as we begin our Lenten journey to Easter. The Ash Wednesday liturgy will premiere at 12 noon on the church YouTube channel and will be available to view any time thereafter.


Kids and the Way of Love

Life Transformed: The Way of Love in Lent

Each week Rev. Gretchen, Rev. Dorcie and others will present one of the seven practices, based in monastic wisdom: turn, pray, learn, bless, rest, worship, go. What makes these particular sessions different is that they will be coupled with themes of Scripture from the Easter Vigil service. Participants will be preparing to experience Easter as the weeks progress. The program is designed for six sessions prior to Easter and then one final session after Easter.

In addition to a short teaching piece each week, participants will break into small groups to discuss a specific Way of Love practice and the themes of Scripture. Each small group will have a facilitator. Each session closes with a brief liturgy. Additional practices for use at home will be suggested each week, as well as a variety of additional resources for deepening one's spiritual life.


Meets on the second Friday at noon

MIC leading our community in Wrestling with the Truth of Colonization

Our anti-racism work will take another step forward in February and March as the Missoula Interfaith Collaborative (MIC) leads the community in five sessions entitled Wrestling with the Truth of Colonization. Moving with indigenous leaders from Missoula, Washington, Oregon, Australia, New Zealand, and Canada, a MIC and international team has developed a training opportunity for helping organizations led predominantly by white leaders in better understanding our own personal and institutional histories as settlers and colonization and its myriad impacts as we work to find meaningful ways forward with our indigenous brothers and sisters. The local MIC team includes Casey Dunning, Joe Chrastil, Rebekah Cochrane, Rai Combs, Lisa Davey, Laura Folkwein, Kaylie Ines, John Lund, Crystal Whiteshield, and Marilynn Zimmerman.

The five sessions will be offered virtually at both 11AM to 1PM, and 6 to



Facts about blood donors

- One donation can save the lives of up to three people.
- The number one reason donors say they give blood is because they "want to help others."
- Two most common reasons cited by people who don't give blood are "Never thought about it" and "I don't like needles."
- Forty-five percent of people in the U.S. have type O (positive or negative) blood.

Blood Drive set for February 25

Donate at our Winter Blood Drive

Holy Spirit Parish will once again support the American Red Cross by hosting a winter blood drive. The drive will be in the Parish Hall on Thursday, February 25th, between 1:00 and 6:00 p.m. The Red Cross usually sees a seasonal drop in blood donations due to holidays and winter weather. But this year, due to the pandemic, thousands of Red Cross blood drives have been canceled as community organizations and businesses restrict access to their locations. Our contribution is critical.

Did you know that the Red Cross supplies about 40% of the nation's blood supply? Donated blood is used for serious injuries, surgeries, childbirth, anemia, blood disorders, cancer treatments, and many other life saving therapies. In addition, the Red Cross is now a source of "convalescent plasma" used to treat COVID-19. Individuals who have recovered from COVID-19 have antibodies that protect against the virus. Blood donated by COVID-19 survivors is processed to remove blood cells, leaving behind liquid, called plasma, and antibodies. This convalescent plasma can be given to patients with COVID-19 to boost their ability to fight the virus. Currently there is a national shortage of convalescent plasma. Please consider giving blood if you or someone you know has recovered from COVID-19. To be eligible to give convalescent plasma an individual must be:


- In good health and generally feeling well.
- Have a prior, verified diagnosis

of COVID-19, but are now symptom-free and fully recovered from COVID-19 and at least 15 days from last date of symptoms.

If you haven't had COVID-19 and are interested in donating blood, here's what you need to know:

- You must be in good health and feeling well.
- You must weigh at least 110 pounds.
- If you are not yet 18 years old, you must have a consent form signed by your parent or guardian. Additional height and weight restrictions apply to those 18 years or younger. Please check with the Red Cross for eligibility.
- The most frequent exclusions are for those who have traveled in certain foreign countries or have low iron (hematocrit count).

Sign up for an appointment to donate blood using the Red Cross online scheduling system at www.redcrossblood.org, or by contacting Patti Beckley (406-396-1837; bpbeckley@gmail.com) or Audrey Murray (612-968-2108; audreymurray196@gmail.com). Creation Care Ministry

Learn more about a new ministry at Holy Spirit – Creation Care

I would love to introduce you all to a relatively new ministry that you may not be aware of. Thanks to Kate
Laney's persistence, we now have The
Creation Care Ministry here at Holy
Spirit. Recycling, reusing, reducing,
repairing, recognition and responsibility
are the six R's that summarize our
stance on slowing climate change.

My family was introduced to and started recycling while living in Germany in 1993. The community was expected to recycle, compost, and use public transportation. In hindsight this was all a concerted effort to help the environment.

The city of Hanover provided one relatively small trash container that was emptied every two weeks. The grocery stores provided bins where you could remove packaging, before even leaving the store, to be recycled. Compost bins for produce extras, such as cornhusks, were also provided. One rule they had in Germany was to idle your car no more than three minutes. We had one car but took public transportation on most trips.

We continued to recycle and to be conscious about our environment when we moved back to the US in 1995. Making efforts to find where to recycle was something we were willing to do.

Gardening has been a big part of our lives, and composting is a part of that process. Recycling Works has a

program to pick up compost weekly, which we are happy to do. They also haul our glass away once a month. To me it is worth the money to do my small part in slowing climate change.

Upon moving to Missoula, I had NorthWest Energy come to our house and do an energy audit with recommendations on how to conserve water and energy. They even wrapped our water heater and provided low flow showerheads, all free of charge.

There are several places here in Missoula that you can take cardboard, newspapers, magazines, tin cans, aluminum cans, milk jugs, #1 plastic PETE, and office paper. Plus if you don't have the ability to collect it, separate it, and haul it, you can have Republic Services come around and pick it up for a fee.

My message to you is, please help our world be a better place for our children, grandchildren, nieces, and nephews. I want them to be able to breathe clean air, see glaciers, clean rivers and lakes, and to appreciate having clean water to drink.
