Socks, gloves, and hats needed for homeless men and women

As we at Holy Spirit Parish ring in the new year, it is time again to embrace what has become a new-year tradition here: collecting warm socks, hats, gloves and scarves for our houseless brothers and sisters who spend large chunks of their day in Missoula's chilly temperatures.

Every January, we collect winter accessories for residents of the Poverello Center, which provides shelter for men and women who otherwise might be living on the streets or in their cars or trucks. This year, our collection will be conducted on three consecutive Sundays, January 8, 15, and 22. Look for the eye-catching red-and-white striped box! There also will be a plastic bin on the porch outside the church office for round-the-clock drop-offs.

We welcome new and gently used items, store-bought or hand-knit hats, gloves, and scarves but especially warm and wooly socks! Please remember: socks should be made from wool or synthetic fabrics such as

Thermolite yarn. Please, NO cotton! Cotton does not keep out the cold and fails to wick away moisture, making feet feel cold and damp. The Pov gives away many, many pairs of socks each day in the winter months so every pair of socks we collect helps a great deal!

Our collection levels were lower last year than for previous years' collections, so we are hoping again to place bins on the porches of parishioners' homes for neighborhood collections. I can provide the bin and signage and will pick up the collections periodically so there is always room for more wooly contents. Please contact me at lucia.solowork@gmail.com if you are interested.

Predictions are for a colder and snowier than average winter this year in Missoula. Please help provide warmth to those who need it most. Many thanks!

From the Rector

Let us be seekers who look, listen, and respond to the Spirit

Sometimes I like to read all the scriptures for each Sunday in a season of the Church year to see what stands out overall. I did this recently with the scriptures for the season of Epiphany, and several themes, or should I say verbs, stood out to me. Whether reading from Isaiah, 1 Corinthians, or the Gospels of John and Matthew, and even in some of the Psalms, certain words caught my eye.

Consider verbs like look, come, and see, or seek. There are more: belong, proclaim, consider, and act. We are told to not point fingers, speak evil of another, and to remove the yokes we put upon others. Clearly this season of Epiphany, "The manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi" (Matthew 2:1-12) – *Miriam Webster Dictionary*, is a time for action. But why? Why is action so much a part of this season?

The Incarnation, God with us and known among us in Jesus, has made the world a different place. Instead of tearing each other down and naming enemies, we are called to a way of life like that of a seeker. A seeker looks in new ways, like the blind who begin to see, and is open to what is seen and heard, willing to learn new things in otherwise well-established ways. Paul reminds us that our proclamation of Good News is visible "not in eloquent wisdom" but in the words and deeds that make our ordinary lives shine a light of hope, the light of Christ, to a despairing world. As we respond to the call of Christ, the whisper of God, the energy of the Spirit, we become individually and together the light of Christ embodied in the world, a light of hope, justice, and love.

The Psalmist writes, "Lord seek my face. Your face, Lord, do I seek." Let us be seekers who look, listen, and respond to the Spirit in ways that reveal Christ's love and hope to those who yearn for it.

A Blessing of Homes

Gertrud Mueller Nelson in her book, *To Dance with God*, reminds us that Epiphany is a time to think about a house blessing. Here's a simplified version:

Leader: Peace be on the house. **All:** And on all who live here.

Leader: You used the light of a star to show all nations and peoples your only begotten son, O God. Allow us to know you and to recognize the epiphanies in our lives

All: All nations will walk in your light and kings in the brilliance of your splendor.

Leader: Bless, O Lord, this household and family. Help us to live in the shelter of this house in peace and health. Inspire us to learn and grow here so that we may contribute to the peace and health of the world around us. Make our house a haven for friends and visitors. Enlighten us with the brilliance of your Epiphany star so that as we leave this house, we might clearly see our way to you in our work and in our play.

All: For yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. **Amen.**

It's traditional to close the blessing with the sign of the cross and to use chalk to write the initials of the three wise men (Caspar, Melchior, Balthasar) over the main doors of the house. Their initials are framed by the numbers of the new year. This is what it might look like over your door: 20 CMB 23.

Opportunities to cultivate, challenge and live our faith

Choral Compline returns on Friday night, January 6 (the Feast of Epiphany)

The tradition of dividing each day into parts and assembling to pray was embraced by early Christian monastic communities. These "canonical hours" came to include "compline," a set of prayers to be said before retiring each night.

The service is sung in candlelight by the Compline Choir. It begins with the "Night Prayer" ("Lord it is night. The night is for stillness . . ."). Canticles and the psalm appointed for the day are chanted. Imbedded in the service are music and meditations appropriate to the church season or themes apropos to

compline's contemplative nature. The final moments center on compline's central prayer, "Guide us waking and guard us sleeping."

The service lasts less than 30 minutes. The candlelit church is open for a half an hour before and after the service for quiet prayer.

This year's compline series will begin on Friday evening, January 6th at 8 p.m. It will be a fitting way to celebrate Epiphany, also known as the "Feast of Lights."




Centering Prayer meets the third Tuesday of the month at 4 p.m.

Blood donors needed!

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention predict a serious spread of flu this year and is already reporting a spike in cases in several states. When seasonal illnesses increase, the number of healthy donors tends to decrease, leaving the Red Cross blood supply vulnerable to a potential shortage.

Holy Spirit's Winter Blood Drive set for February 2

It's time once again to roll up your sleeves and help save lives

Holy Spirit Parish will host its annual winter blood drive on **Thursday, February 2, from 1:00 – 6:00 p.m.** in the Parish Hall.

According to the American Red Cross:

Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood. Blood is essential to help patients survive surgeries, cancer treatment, chronic illnesses, and traumatic injuries. This lifesaving care starts with one person making a generous donation. The need for blood is constant. But only about 3% of age-eligible people donate blood yearly. You can help the American Red Cross make sure that supply meets demand.

The Red Cross provides about 40% of our nation's blood and blood components, all from generous volunteer donors. And since the time blood can be stored before its use is limited, regular donation is needed to ensure that blood is always available when it is needed. The Red Cross continues to address a nationwide blood shortage. Donors of all blood types are needed to give now to ensure blood is available when patients need it.

You can sign up for an appointment to donate blood using the Red Cross online scheduling system at www.redcrossblood.org or by contacting Elizabeth Drummond (406-240-8873;


The basic requirements to donate are:

- You must be in good health and feeling well.
- You must weigh at least 110 pounds.
- If you are not yet 18 years old, you must have a consent form signed by your parent or guardian. Additional height and weight restrictions apply to those 18 years or younger.

In a cloud of witnesses

Prior to 2015, when Rev. Terri gave a teaching seminar on advocacy in the Episcopal Church, the Episcopal Church for me meant dignified and beautiful liturgy, toleration of divergent beliefs in its members, and parishioners active in local charities. The seminar was a wonderful eye-opener on the national church's admirable work on social justice. For decades, our national church has been identifying issues in our society, formulating positions on them, proposing solutions, and calling on church members to advocate for these solutions with their elected officials.

Seeing the Church's work and care on problems ranging from violence against Indigenous women, to profitmaking on the backs of incarcerated people of color, to degradation of the natural world filled me with a new pride in the value and dignity of my church.

The Church's Office of Government Relations (OGR) identifies its mission as representing the Church's policy priorities to the U.S. government. Through its Episcopal Public Policy Network (EPPN), the OGR works to educate, equip, and engage Episcopalians to advocate for just government policies that are in line with Episcopalian and Christian values.

The five major policy areas of the OGR are

- Creation Care
- Racial Reconciliation
- Ending Poverty
- Migration, Refugees and Immigration
- Human Rights and Peacebuilding

The OGR provides resources to educate us on these issues, help us build relationships with elected officials, and alert us to critical legislation and policy initiatives at the federal level.


