homeless men and women**

As you contemplate making—and keeping(!)—resolutions for the new year, please include a plan to donate warm winter apparel to Missoula's neediest residents.

Once again, Holy Spirit will be conducting a drive for warm socks, hats, and gloves to go to residents of the Poverello Center who spend many of their daytime hours in our cold, blustery winter weather. (For those new to our community, the Poverello Center provides shelter to members of Missoula's homeless and underserved population.) The drive will begin on Sunday, January 12, and continue through Sunday, January 26. That also is the date of our Annual Meeting so we hope you will “sock it” big that final day of the drive.

While we appreciate all donations, wool or synthetic socks are best. Please avoid cotton socks as they make feet perspire and leave the wearer with cold, damp feet! Hand-knitted socks, hats, and gloves are always welcome. Watch also for post-holiday sales that many stores have.

Look in the parish hall for the red-and-white-striped box festooned with dangling hats plus socks and gloves whose mates have long ago gone missing. For the past several years, parishioners have generously donated about 80 pounds of these essential items. Unfortunately, the need increases every year so please let our donations do the same. unexpired term of a departed Vestry member. The slate of candidates will be finalized at the January Vestry meeting, and then we will print the profiles of the nominees in the Sunday bulletin and the *Spirited Times*.

## Volunteer support is a great boost to Church School Church School changes: the results

We've continued to follow the feedback we got from parents and families. We're working towards integrating children more fully into the life of the parish. This fall we have experimented with devoting one Sunday a month to shared worship with adults, and two Sundays a month the children have a brief worship time designed specifically for them followed by shared Eucharist with adults. The final Sunday of the month is devoted to either service projects or a special craft.

The upshot? Things have felt a little chaotic at times, and there is less continuity within the program. Sometimes we miss that. But this affords children the opportunity to participate in worship with their church family at least three times a month. Worshiping upstairs is no longer an isolated occasion; it's just normal. Kids are part of the flow. And sometimes they seem surprised to see people they know. Our kids are in the pews, under the pews, laying low behind the pews (playing with the toys). They are in the aisle, in the chancel and kneeling at the Communion rail. They are absorbing beauty, witnessing quiet ritual, and learning about mystery through their mere presence in the space.

Also, our changes, mostly the changes in my schedule as Assistant Priest, have paved the way for more leadership within Church School. We have four different storytellers (with a

fifth just now joining us) that trade off leading children's worship. We haven't had this sort of variety in the leadership of our program for at least 20 years. We're still finding our way. We're still learning. But change is happening, and rest assured, the Holy Spirit is in the mix. Other volunteers are helping in new ways as well.

Wednesdays have become volunteer days in the office, and they do things like shopping for supplies, decorating classrooms, researching service projects, and planning craft activities. This volunteer support has been a great boost to the Church School program. Not only do the volunteers get the tasks done, but they bring their own expertise, vision and creativity, expanding the jobs and building on the ministry. What a joy!

If you would like to be part of the mix, learning to tell Bible stories for children's worship or volunteering periodically on Wednesdays, please contact me. We'd love to fold you in and then step back and see how the Holy Spirit uses your gifts and skills in new and sometimes surprising ways. Call the church office at 542-2167 or email

Presiding Bishop Curry calls upon followers of Jesus to join with him in the Good Book Club, reading the Gospel of John each day during the Epiphany season.

The Good Book Club offers an array of resources developed by partners from across the Episcopal Church, making it easy for people to read, learn, and wrestle with the Gospel of John. The church-wide Bible initiative starts January 6, 2020.

Joining the Good Book Club is easy: open your Bible and start reading! In addition, Episcopal and Anglican partners have come together and prepared resources to support the journey, including print and online Bible studies, webinars, reflections, blogs, and social media posts. Pick up a companion book, *A Journey with John*, from the church office for \$13.

The book of John is a fascinating book. It differs from the other three Gospels in many ways. John includes nothing about the birth or baptism of Jesus. There are no parables. There is no transfiguration. There is no condemnation of the rich and nothing about helping the poor. So what makes this Gospel so powerful? Come. Discover the beautiful, spiritual, meaningful Word that is the Book of John.

### Mark the close of the Christmas season Join us for Compline on January 5

*You are the deep innerness of all things,  
The last word that can never be spoken.  
To each of us you reveal yourself differently:  
To the ship as coastline, to the shore as a ship. (from Rilke's Book of Hours)*

Why not use Compline on January 5<sup>th</sup> to mark Twelfth Night and the close of the Christmas season? The service will be held at 8 p.m. on Sunday, January 5<sup>th</sup>. The Holy Spirit Compline Choir will begin the service with an 11<sup>th</sup> century chant setting of "Of the Father's love begotten" and end with the ancient carol "A great and mighty wonder." The meditations for the evening will be short poems on divine love by Rainer Maria Rilke.

Our February service falls on February 2<sup>nd</sup>. We will celebrate Epiphany and return to the Northumberland Daily Celtic Prayer Book for the service's meditations.

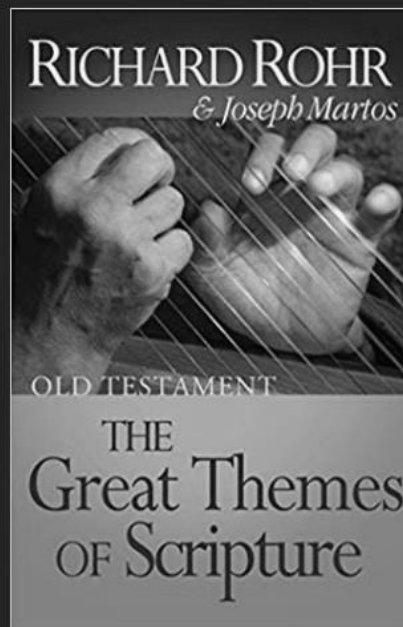

From the Rector  
**The joy of blessings and home**

I was recently invited by Jim and Jeanne Clark to offer a house blessing in their new home. It was a wonderful occasion shared with friends. I thought to myself, “I’ll bet many do not know this is something available to them.” Whether you’ve lived in the same home for many years or have just moved into a new abode, the service is available to you. The basic outline of the service for **The Celebration of a Home** is found in **The Book of Occasional Services** alongside such things as Seasonal Blessings, The Way of the Cross, and A Public Service of Healing. It is designed in a manner that allows flexibility and adaptation as needed.

We gathered in the kitchen for opening prayers and lit a candle that would be carried from room to room. From there, everyone but our hosts went outside. We began the prayers and blessings. With a knock on the door, they welcomed us in, and we went room to room, offering formal and informal prayers in each: Entryway, Study, Utility Rooms, Garage, Music Room, Master Bedroom and Bath, Kitchen, Dining Room and the Great

Room/Living Room. Jim and Jeanne were asked if they wanted to share something important about each space and soon important threads of not only their stories but those of prior generations were knit into a story of shared life. Gathered in prayers, blessings, and even chanting, the entire home was blessed by God’s grace. Food, beverage and conversation brought new friends together and home to what was once a house.

As everyone headed to their homes, I stepped out into the night. Above was the almost full moon and neighboring homes bathed in light. I thought of immigrants and refugees seeking a home, of those who have become homeless and of the need to pray and act to make home a reality for all. I thought of the Star of Bethlehem over humble surroundings, God with us, and the light of Christ continually overcoming the darkness. I thought of the many homes, family and friends that fill my life’s story. God bless us all with a place to call home.

Mark your calendars! This year’s event happens Friday, January 31, at Revive Church, 2811 Latimer. Volunteers are needed!

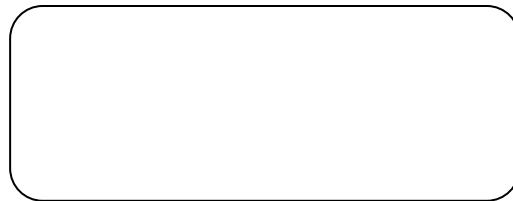
