# Join us on a field trip to the Lee Metcalf Wildlife Area this month!

The Creation Care Ministry is helping us live more sustainably by looking at practices at Holy Spirit and sharing information with our congregation which we can apply at home. They are also reaching out to other churches and organizations to partner in improving our communities and state.

Another goal of the ministry is to learn about and celebrate our beautiful environment here in this last best place. To that end, the ministry is offering a field trip each month to take us out to some of the unique local locations and events to enjoy nature. We will also offer opportunities to visit locations where we can learn more about living sustainably.

Our first field trip will be a visit to Lee Metcalf US Fish & Wildlife **Area on May 22.** The refuge is just north of Stevensville and is well marked on the highways. We should be able to catch the end of migratory birds passing through, as well as look for other local wildlife and spring flowers. We will meet at **8:00 AM in** the parking lot of the visitor's center. We will have a spotting scope, field guides and binoculars which we will share. If you have your own, please bring them along. We will spend some time looking at the waterfowl in the large ponds by the visitor's center and then walk the hard surfaced nature trail behind the center.

## From the Rector Let us rejoice!

As I write for this Paraclete newsletter, we are just four days from transitioning back to a pandemic form of in-person worship in the sanctuary, a first since more than a year ago. At the same time, we will have Bishop Marty Stebbins visit and a baptism which I find very fitting in a number of ways. The bishop's presence reminds us that our parish is one part of many in the body of Christ. Baptism reminds us of the first step Jesus took before he was driven by the Spirit into the wilderness and then began his ministry. It all reminds us of our calling as Christians to love one another as Christ loves us and that we walk in the way of Jesus, always on the move with Good News. And while we transition back into the sanctuary, we will evolve in our ability to continue to provide virtual worship for those who are not yet able or cannot join us in person. This too will take time to address our needs for improved technological support so that we can live-stream in real time. But for now, we will record the service and present it later in the day on YouTube. In many ways we are restoring and renewing a vintage car or truck so that we can again be on the move.

We've been walking in the wilderness, and in reality, we continue to do so in many respects. To love one another means continuing to think not only of ourselves but those around us. The pandemic is not done, not gone, and is still evolving even while vaccinations increase. We know some things now that we didn't a year ago. We need to see what we've learned and continue to adapt. We know even now that just getting back to worship in a physically gathered way is not as easy as closing up. It will take baby steps, falls, and letting God pick us back up to keep growing and exploring this different world. Worship is just one part of beginning anew. Step by step, we will begin to gather in small groups outside and in our buildings. We will continue to live by ever evolving good practices as are needed during these times.

Stay tuned. Adventure continues to await, and the Spirit is a movin'. Let us rejoice in it!

### **Anti-Racism: Our Response**

This last year has been tumultuous for all kinds of reasons; in the forefront now are the events that led to George Floyd's death, as we watch the trial unfold. And as we see yet again another young black man, Daunte Wright, shot and killed during a traffic stop in Brooklyn Center, Minnesota. These horrific and ugly events cry out for our attention, demonstrating that racism continues to be a part of our cultural fabric.

In 2020 we hosted a five-session Lenten program addressing issues of race and faith. Members of our congregation also participated in an 8week True Colors: White Allies workshop, facilitated by Empower MT, and designed to educate about racism and offer tools to combat it. In the fall, as a diocese we adopted a resolution to Root Out Racism. This winter we hosted a book study which helped illuminate the injustices which people of color have suffered. We heard from folks along the way, encouraging us to focus on issues of racism that are "close at hand," namely racism towards Native Americans.

We are just now forming a Native American Anti-Racism Task Force that will work together to seek out educational opportunities for the parish, helping us all more clearly identify racism towards Native Americans in our community and our state. The goal is education to assist us in dismantling racism of every kind, moving closer towards becoming that *Beloved Community*.



#### From the Assistant Priest

### Our history shapes us

We live in an over-sized state with a dramatic landscape. It's a place in which we can get lost; it's a landscape that can provide anonymity, and spiritual solace, if that's what we're seeking. Many of us are, drawn by the land, the Spirit of the place, if you will. Many would agree that this place, this state of Montana with its wild open spaces, not only calls to us, but shapes us. I contend that it is both the land, and the history of the place, that has the power to shape us.

Too often, I believe, as the dominate white culture, when we refer to history, we have taken a narrow view, thinking of white history as *universal history*. When we do this, we neglect the rich history of the place and the people that transpired right alongside white people, and *long before* any white person set foot in the place. That history, known or unknown, shapes us. It is time to be intentional about seeking it out and bringing it to the surface.


Just as a wind-swept vista or craggy outcropping of mountain has power to shape our imagination and Spirit, so too does the knowledge that peoples gathered in this valley for generations digging Bitterroots along the Clark Fork where the U of M campus now sits, and in one of the most productive digging sites, the current WinCo parking lot on Reserve.

When we think Higgins Street Bridge, we likely think of C.P. Higgins, a co-founder, along with Frank Worden, of the Hellgate Trading Post and the city of Missoula. We likely don't think of other history associated with the bridge, such as the Salish *Trail of Tears*. Some 300 Salish people were marched along the bridge, leaving their homeland in the Bitterroot Valley and forcibly relocated onto the Flathead Reservation in 1891. Chief Charlo resisted the removal for many years, but ultimately felt he had no choice for the well-being of his people. This history also shapes us.

I am grateful that we have an opportunity to learn more about this place we live and the history of its people. On May 1<sup>st</sup> at 11:00 a.m.

Traveler's Rest State Park is hosting a Zoom event featuring poet Victor Charlo, the great-great grandson of Chief Charlo, and his daughter, Claire Charlo, a civil advocate. I hope you will take this opportunity to learn more about this place and its history as we reflect on the many ways it continues to shape us all even today.

Please mark your calendar for this special Sunday and plan to join us!


