Our Lenten journey begins on Ash Wednesday, March 2

Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent, derives its name from the ancient practice of marking the foreheads of worshippers with ashes from the unused palm branches of the previous year. As the service for Ash Wednesday says:

Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

Join us on Ash Wednesday, March 2, as we begin our Lenten journey to Easter. Our in-person service with the Imposition of Ashes will take place at 7 p.m. at the church. This in-person service will be recorded and available for viewing after the fact. This is subject to change; if our technology is in place by that time, we'll live-stream this service. 
With continuing uncertainty around COVID, we will meet via Zoom from 7-8:30 PM on Wednesdays March 9, 16, 23, 30, and April 6. Each session will include a large group teaching led by Valerie Hess as well as small group times. We will end each session by praying Compline. Through Zoom, we will again partner with St. Paul's in Hamilton. Feel free to invite friends from other places to join in as well.

The book is an easy read. Between sessions, participants will be encouraged to read between 25 and 40 pages. There are suggested practices you can do on your own as well as discussion questions we will use for the small group time. You may also choose to reflect on them in a journal. In short, you can engage as much or as little you want.



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We Learn, Pray and Act to support refugees

In just a few short weeks, our first pilgrimage to the borderlands will begin. It seems like it has taken such a long time for the pilgrimage to arrive, although it has been less than a year since we first talked about it. Perhaps it seems a long time because so much has gone on around us since we partnered with RGBM last July. The Rev. Dr. Jacqui Lewis says that we live in "hot-mess times" (Richard Rohr's Daily Meditations, February 7, 2022), and such times require us to answer the question, "Who are we to be?" At Holy Spirit we are living that question with courage and faith through our partnership with RGBM. We are to be people who learn, pray, and act to support those who seek refuge in our country. Here are a few ways you can help this month:

LEARN: Visit the Hope Border Institute website (<u>www.hopeborder.org</u>) to learn more about people seeking refuge in the U.S. This website currently features asylum seekers' responses to the question, "What led you to leave your home?" Some of the responses may surprise you. **PRAY:** During the month of March, please give thanks for our partnership with the RGBM community. Pray for our shared mission to ensure that our migrant neighbors are embraced in the service of justice, the interest of dignity, and the spirit of love. And, please, pray for the members of our diocesan community who will make a pilgrimage to the borderlands on March 7th and March 27th.

ACT: Help us raise money for RGBM. On June 1st Holy Spirit will host a fundraiser for the Rio Grande Borderland Ministries. They need our help, and we need yours! Lent 2022 Suggestions for families for Lent

Research tells us that religious practices that start in the home are the most likely practices to stick with a child throughout his or her life. So during Lent consider trying a different religious practice at home each week.

1st Week Sunday March 6th

Consider creating a Lenten quiet corner somewhere in your home. Engage your children in creating this space. You might want to include a Bible, other books, musical instruments or CDs, images of nature or items collected from nature, drawing paper, or a journal. Encourage each member of your family to use the space once during the week. You may find it easier to use the space if you start with a prompt like listening to God. Put it at the top of a journal page or on a piece of drawing paper.

2nd Week Sunday March 13th

Practice "passing the peace" every day this week. Engage your child in

determining what time slot during the day this may work best.

3rd Week Sunday March 20th

Make a list of blessings and then sing the doxology every day this week. *Praise God, from whom all blessings flow;*

Praise him all creatures here below; Praise him above, ye heavenly host: Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.

4th Week Sunday March 27th

Share prayer requests with one another this week.

5th Week Sunday April 3rd

Say the Lord's Prayer together every day this week.

When does Baptism take place at Holy Spirit?

Holy Baptism is full initiation by water and the Holy Spirit into Christ's Body the Church. Baptism takes place during the Easter Vigil service (Saturday evening, in April), and at a Sunday service about three times a year: the Day of Pentecost (the first Sunday in June this year), the Sunday after All Saints' Day (early November), and the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord (the first Sunday after Epiphany, in early January). Baptism may also take place when the bishop visits (in December this year), and on a Sunday during the summer on a date to be determined. If you are interested in Baptism for yourself or for your child, preparation needs to take place. Please contact the office at (406) 542-2167 to speak with our rector, The Rev. Terri Ann Grotzinger.

The next date for Baptism will be on Saturday, April 16, at the Easter Vigil service.



From the Creation Care Ministry Keeping a Creative Journal

"Strange as it may seem in this era of high technology, the use of a personal journal is re-emerging as one of the most powerful of today's tools. It speaks to the need for "high touch" and is available to help support an expanding quest for personal as well as organizational and corporate creativity." – Dr. Bill Hammond, <u>The</u> Creative Journal.

Journals generally come in three categories; a diary for recording personal history, a field notebook to record natural events and phenology, and the creative journal – an idea catching tool for recording creative ideas and expressions. All have value, and you can make your journal a hybrid of each.

On March 19 the Creation Care Ministry is offering a journaling workshop where you will have the opportunity to make your own journal and participate in journaling activities to get you started, as Dr. Hammond says, "bonding to your journal." We will use writing prompts, create your own "rules" for your journal, try out tools to use in journal writing and capturing moments, and learn simple ways to keep your journal entries fresh and creative.

Special music planned for March 6 Women composers featured

On Sunday, March 6th, Holy Spirit will join with congregations throughout the United States and Great Britain, celebrating International Woman's Day (the 8th) by featuring music by women composers during the service. The event is co-sponsored by the American Guild of Organists and the [British] Society for Women Organists, which is an outgrowth of the Royal College of Organists. Nancy Cooper is the Director of the AGO National Task Force for Gender Equity and spearheaded the AGO's participation in this important event. Our service that day will highlight a Shaker hymn, the text and tune of which were written ca. 1867 by Sister Polly Rupe, who lived at the Shaker settlement in Pleasant Hill, Kentucky. Music by women composers will also be included as the prelude and postlude.

Community Ministries An invitation to recall and reauthor the stories that shape us

At a recent Retreat with Bishop Marty, Deacons used Edward Wimberly's book entitled Recalling Our Own Stories - Spiritual Renewal for Religious Caregivers. Its premise is that for religious caregivers – lay and ordained – to be effective and faithful to our calling, we need to regularly revisit and reconnect with our original call. We can do this by diving more deeply into the myths that shape us – myths being the stories we tell about beliefs and convictions we hold about ourselves. our relationships to others, our roles in life, and our ministries.

Our myths are often rooted in our families of origin. To understand their aiding or hindering influences, Wimberly encourages the use of genograms. We begin by looking back two generations into our biological/constructed family, at the people and the relationships therein, and how they have shaped our personal and ministry myths/stories.

Reflecting on these myths, we may recognize themes, evaluate if they still hold truth for us, look for where God is moving in them, and determine if they are now aiding or hindering our ability and passion to live into our call today. We are then better equipped to edit or reauthor – with God and in community – those aspects where change may be needed.

Wimberly's book proved valuable as we considered our stories and encourage those alongside us. May it be such a gift for you, too.
