

- We're gearing up for the next edition of Project Community Connect, which is an all-day
 one-stop resource shop for folks to connect to resources, learn about employment
 opportunities, pick up clothing or get a haircut plus new this year is "Homeless Court", an
 opportunity to get some assistance quashing misdemeanor violations, etc. This year's event
 happens Friday, Jan. 31, at Revive Church, 2811 Latimer. Volunteers are needed!
- Salvation Army's winter shelter program works to assist individuals and families
 experiencing homelessness gain access to or maintain housing during the coldest
 months by leveraging funds for either rent or deposit. For information on qualifications, or
 to pick up an application, stop by the facility at 355 S Russell or call 549-0710. The
 program includes extra cash incentive for folks who undergo educational programming,
 like a budget workshop.

Every day, hundreds of individuals and families in Missoula face the stresses of homelessness. The DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel Missoula Edgewater donated four rooms for Family Promise from December 15th through the 22nd. Volunteers also brought meals every day. This was a fantastic week for the families and a generous donation of approximately \$3000!

This year, we sheltered 12 families, and are currently sheltering 4 more. We helped house 8 families, all of whom are still in stable housing with the help of Family Mentoring and continued support from MIC. New overnight host groups added to the rotation are Individuals from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, DoubleTree, Sleep Inn, and Staybridge. Providence Health has joined to provide meals and volunteers. Emergency on-call rotation answered by volunteers is beginning in 2020. Two JV's have been tremendous support to the program.

Bridges & Leaders

MIC's Community Organizing Program, Bridges and Leaders, had an amazing year in 2019! We **trained over 130 institutional, community leaders** in the methods and practices of community organizing, storytelling, and effective public engagement. We **turned out an average of 50**

people belonging to over 30 member organizations to our monthly strategic leadership meetings. On 3 different occasions, we drew over 200 people as well as local elected officials to 3 public assemblies concerning statewide Medicaid Expansion, funding for mental health care, and issues affecting housing affordability for low to medium-income earners living in Missoula.

Currently, Bridges and Leaders is in a power-building phase. We are solidifying trained Core Teams of leaders

within each of our member organizations. We are collaborating with a wider array of community organizations on common pressures facing everyday Missoulians. We are making plans to broaden our base of committed partnerships in order to leverage our strengths.

Welcome Back

Welcome Back is a coalition of individuals directly impacted by incarceration who are joined by community supporters to discuss the impacts of incarceration and re-entry, and to work together towards breaking down the barriers to re-entry. We do this

through regular social gatherings and fellowship, through direct mentoring and advocacy with folks coming out of the corrections system, and by organizing to identify the pressures impacting these individuals and working with community partners to identify solutions.

Inspiring Stories

Given the choice of staying in a dysfunctional relationship or packing up her two kids and heading out, Lor did what many good mothers do: She stayed. For years she stayed. Her kids needed their dad. They needed his support and income. Where would she go, anyway? Finally, late last year, he made the decision for them.

"A lot of people don't understand, but domestic violence is mental as well," she said. "I was mentally incapable of leaving because he had the money. And had he not left? I'd still be in that situation."

Lor and the boys moved into the best place she could afford on short notice – a trailer that reeked of cat urine and was infested with bugs. She didn't get along with the landlord and he gave her notice to get out, so Lor and the boys hit the streets. For six weeks last summer, the three shuffled back and forth from motel to motel at a total cost of \$2,000. She dropped application fees at four different places and was denied by each of them. She made it to the top of the list for subsidized housing, but just before she was to move in, she learned that her application was again denied. Lor found out the hard way that the balance of power is tipped heavily in favor of the landlord, and her previous landlord was not keen on letting bygones be bygones. "I felt defeated," she said. "I had money, but the landlord was giving me a bad reference. And it was lies."

She tried Family Promise, but didn't think it would work for her disabled son. She even spent a weekend camping in a tent so that she might qualify for the YWCA's emergency housing for families, but learned even that shelter had a waiting list. In Missoula, there are no other emergency options until the Meadowlark opens. seethemhome.org


In August, Lor reached out to the Housing Advocate Network for help. She got a match – a woman named Kat who works at the YMCA – and who spent some time working at a homeless shelter in Kansas. Kat said she didn't do much for Lor except provide support and a listening ear. She also helped Lor write a letter of explanation - a plea, if you will, for a prospective landlord to overlook the bad reference of the former. "You can't save someone or fix someone, you can just accompany them on their journey where they're at," Kat said. So she just met with Lor, talked with her, learned a little about her story, and told her that she believed in her. For Lor, it was just the right time to enlist some moral support: In September, she found a compassionate ear. A private landlord said she could move in to his two-bedroom for \$875 per month but that she would have until the end of September to pay the security deposit and last month's rent. She would also need application approval.

"I didn't want to lie," she said. "So when I went with him I battled: Should I lie? Should I fabricate just a little bit? When I met with him he said, 'I really appreciate honesty.' I was on my way out the door. I said, 'If I'm going to be honest, I need to tell you about my last landlord.' And I told him."

He understood, and she and the boys moved in. She worked her tail off to come up with some extra money. She reached out and got some support from Missoula agencies, but in the end the new landlord wrote off the the remaining balance.

Would Lor have found a place to live without Kat? Probably. She's certainly not lacking in resourcefulness. She had the job, she had the income. She had her faith. But meeting up with Kat and having another person to shoulder some of the hopelessness was real. Lor said it was simply this - human relationship - that helped her believe hope was ahead. "Sometimes you just need a cheerleader," she said.
