
Bishop's annual visitation takes place on March 1

Our bishop, The Rt. Rev. Martha E. Stebbins, will be with us on March 1 for her regular visitation and for Confirmation at the 10:15 a.m. service. As chief pastor and teacher of the diocese, she will preside and preach at both services that morning. Her presence connects us to Episcopalians beyond our walls, in Montana, in the Episcopal Church, in the Anglican Communion, and back through the Church's history. While most of us will only see her on Sunday morning, she will be working hard to learn more about Holy Spirit Episcopal Church by meeting with the Vestry and clergy, hearing and responding to their concerns and questions. Youth and an adult who have spent time preparing for

Confirmation will reaffirm their baptismal promises and receive the sacrament of Confirmation, to strengthen them and affirm them in their lives of discipleship.

Race and Faith: Respecting the Dignity of Every Human Being

Join us for our 2020 Lenten Series entitled, *Race & Faith: Respecting the Dignity of Every Human Being*. Our baptismal vows pose a series of questions: Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord? Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ? Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? We answer these questions with: I will, with God's help.

Lent is an appropriate time to reflect on our baptismal commitments. It's a time to take stock and consider what we have committed to and how we work that out in our daily lives. This year we'll look through the lens of our baptism at issues of racism.

Wednesday March 4th U of M Professor Tobin Miller Shearer will present, *Racism and the Church: A* (*Very*) Short History. This session will explore the history of Christianity's connection to, participation in, and resistance against racism in the United States.

Wednesday March 11th U of M Professor Tobin Miller Shearer will present, *Privilege and Spiritual Formation*. In this session, we will explore the connections between the privileging forces of racism and spiritual formation in the Christian tradition.

Wednesday March 18th Judith Heilman, Executive Director of The Montana Racial Equity Project, will present, *The Black (Non)Accrual of Wealth and Reparations*. This session will study the history and causes of Black-white racial wealth inequality and the call for reparations.

Wednesday March 25th U of M Professor David Beck of the Native American Studies program will present, Tribal Sovereignty and American Indian Religious Freedom. American Indian tribes have a unique political relationship with the United States due to their status as nations within a nation. Yet they continue to struggle to exert the "tribal sovereignty" that is theirs under law. At the same time, the United States claims to be a nation founded on the idea of religious liberty. Yet the first Americans have historically been denied the right to practice their religions, and this is also something with which they still struggle. This talk will look at the intertwining of tribal sovereignty and American Indian religious freedom.

Wednesday April 1st Professor Tobin Miller Shearer will present, *Formation: Anti-Racist Practice as Spiritual Discipline*. In this interactive session, we will work with a series of case studies to learn best practices for interrupting racism when we encounter it in our daily lives and interactions. The wisdom of the spiritual disciplines will guide our discussion.

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
Church School Start a quiet family reflection time during Lent

A season of quiet contemplation for kids? Lent may seem like a bit of a "spiritual stretch" for our children, but I think you might be surprised. I challenge you to start a practice during Lent of quiet family reflection time. Make a ritual of it. Engage the senses. Agree on a time and place. Set the stage, maybe light a candle or bring in other sorts of visuals. Consider using the liturgical colors of Lent (historically purple, often now we use maroon and black). Ring a bell or use a chime sound on your phone to start. Frame the experience as a quiet time to listen to God. Make it short. Depending on the

age of your children you may want to start with 3 to 5 minutes, working up to 10 minutes or more could be a great goal. Provide opportunity to *respond* to the experience through a journal (for older children), or paints, pencils and paper (you might invest in some nicer supplies to underscore the significance of the practice), and fold in a short time for family members to share thoughts and prayer. 
Listening for God's voice through meditation and journaling: April 4, from 9:30 a.m.-11 a.m.




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Join us for Compline on March 1 at 8 p.m. Lenten meditations in the quiet of Compline




Rummage Sale set for May 1 and 2 May Day! May Day! Yes, May 1-2 – This year's rummage event
