Hellgate Sunday 2020: Learn, pray, act with us November 15

There is little we recognize as normal, or typical, in these days of COVID, uncertainty, and unrest. We are looking at our lives and those of our neighbors through changed lenses. From our church yard, we can now see our Hellgate High School students crossing 6th in their masks, and we try to imagine all the ways their lenses have needed to change, too. Some of the challenges of "not enough" - time, access, clarity, respite, safe bases – are looming larger. And Hellgate's Family Resource Center coordinator, Tracy Ledyard, tells us that the number of students who are experiencing homelessness is already running two to three times that of recent years.

November 15th – this year's Hellgate Sunday – will invite us all to look

through the lenses of some of our Hellgate neighbors to help us learn, pray, and act in some ways that might bring Christ's Love into new focus for us all. Church School 2020

Building faith habits

How do children learn? We know that one of the most powerful teaching tools we have as parents is our ability to model behavior. Like it or not, there it is. You know the power of example, I am sure. Studies about spiritual formation are no different. Kids learn faith by watching adults. This can feel daunting, particularly when our faith may feel so personal, private, and intimate. Sometimes our experiences and practices of faith seem to defy description. No worries, especially for small children, the description isn't as important as the practice.

Let them see you . . . reading the Bible, the Book of Common Prayer, or other devotional book. What's on your nightstand? What books and resources are piled by your armchair? Be aware. Be intentional. Even these small things count. Have your children seen you journaling, or praying, or doing art, or going for a walk to celebrate God's beautiful creation? All these things count. Even a brief description such as, journaling helps me talk to God, or making art helps me listen to the Holy Spirit, are powerful examples!

Next invite your children into the practice as they are able and have

interest. Perhaps they need their own journal – a special one – to draw pictures for God. Maybe a special children's devotional book or children's Bible for their bedside table? Our kids are innately spiritual. Use their strengths – wonder, imagination, and play – as touchstones to discover their own spiritual wisdom.

Consider "playing" church with your kids. The lines between play and reality are blurry for children. That's OK. For children, play is a method for integrating reality. If you're playing church, ask them what sorts of things you will need to set the space. I am guessing they will know. Their imagination will assist you as you create a sacred space at home; perhaps you'll use color, or a special cloth, or candles. Once created you may decide together that your "home church" should periodically come back out. It could be a space for prayer, art, or Bible reading as you decide together.

Grace and peace to your family as you build faith habits together during this time of pandemic.




Access Centering Prayer online as well as in person

But weekly miracles have sprung up, big and small, and they have been unexpected and surprising, and I am so, so very thankful for them. So Happy Early Thanksgiving to you all, and for the many blessings we have shared together during "covid-tide."

Virtual Diocesan Convention? Who knew!

Everyone wondered how Diocesan Convention would happen this year due to the limitations on large gatherings brought on by the pandemic. The diocesan staff went to work months ago and produced a totally new online Virtual Diocesan Convention that was held with delegates from all over the diocese on October 9-10 with a diocesan-wide virtual worship service available October 11.

While we prefer to have worship together in person each day, we shared prayer, scripture, reflection and music thanks to the online contributions of many, even some of our choir members and organist Dr. Nancy Cooper, in the "Hollywood Squares" way we've used for our own virtual Sunday services. Bishop Marty did a wonderful job weaving the laments of one of our legislative resolutions on racism into the Saturday morning worship and her sermon time, resulting in a powerful and prayerful reminder that all we do at Diocesan Convention is immersed in prayer and done in response to God's call to us in Christ.

Everything went very smoothly considering the entire endeavor had to rely on the patience and persistence of all the delegates with varying internet connections around the diocese and

learning as we journeyed along. The strength of the virtual format was the ability to hear instructions, voice concerns for and against resolutions, and complete the business of the diocese with voting in an efficient, orderly fashion without all the talk-over and noise confusion that are normal parts of a larger in-person gathering. More details about the decisions of this convention will come soon.

I want to especially thank diocesan staff members Barb Hagen and Jill Sallin for all the hard work that obviously went into the preparation for and implementation of the Virtual Diocesan Convention 2020, and to Bishop Marty for the way she oversaw all of it. Well done!! While we missed the opportunity to share work and fun with old friends and new, it was a worthwhile endeavor. Perhaps we will find a way to do a hybrid of sorts for the next convention, but meanwhile, thanks to everyone who supported the effort with their time and talents. Thanks too to all of our delegates from Holy Spirit: your willingness to learn new things and be together even online made a real difference!

A Reflection from the Rector

Oh, to be together again...

What challenging times we are in. I can't tell you how many times I've thought about our ancestors in recent months: what history tells us about the struggles they had with pandemics, economic hardship, and loss of loved ones, and in more difficult living circumstances than in our day and age. I find that scripture and prayer come to life in new ways, as in the laments of the Psalms with the cry of despair, and the longing for what was and is lost. Most of us have never been through a pandemic such as Covid-19, a very real virus that can destroy strong and weak alike or leave one physically less-abled even after "recovery." I am seeing and hearing anew.

Every day I awake wondering when we will be able to gather together again safely. Sound familiar? When will we *physically, together*, sing the hymns, hear the scriptures, offer our prayers (sung and said, choir and congregation), reflect, and share the Eucharist? When will we be together? When will we be able to visit our loved ones? When will we be able to celebrate weddings and funerals, Thanksgiving and Christmas, together, in the full presence of one

another? The answer is that we do not know, not yet. We wander, with God, in the wilderness.

I also awake daily aware of you, and I pray for whatever circumstances you may be experiencing. Others are praying too, near and far. When you are lonely, depressed, or despairing, know that you are remembered in those prayers. The struggles are real, and they hit all of us in different ways. None of us are "used to this," not one. Yet we hold on to the promises of God known to us in Christ Jesus, that we are loved, we matter, and this present darkness is not all there is. We give thanks, offer encouragement, and celebrate the tiniest of joys, nurturing life. The light shines in the darkness: in us and to the world, always.

If you need help, or know someone who does, let us know. We will do whatever we are able to respond. Keep the faith, for God is faithful. And may the peace of God that passes all understanding, remain with you – always.
