We will celebrate the Missoula Food Bank on Sunday, November 20

As a part of our alms-giving Sunday series, Holy Spirit will celebrate the long role we have played in supporting this important community organization.

Holy Spirit support for the Food Bank goes all the way back to the 1980s, when then rector Steve Oreskovich and other community leaders revitalized the Food Bank. As described by The Rev. Oreskovich:

The [Food Bank] board was reconstituted with a group of younger members including Ray Risho, the restaurant owner, and myself. We started a monthly program of contacting and inviting downtown businesspeople to a free lunch at HSP to reintroduce them to the idea of the Food Bank. Worked great and support increased, and so did giving and support. About the time I went off the board Brenda Oreskovich went on, and during her term the Board

bought a building, and Holy Spirit helped retire the final debt.

For several years, Holy Spirit parishioners brought food items to the church on one Sunday a month. The donations were blessed and then sent to the Food Bank. Today, we continue to support the Food Bank with the little yellow Food Fund envelopes found in all of our pews.

And our support today is just as important as it was 40 years ago! For the past several years, the number of unique customers being served by the Missoula Food Bank and Community Center has skyrocketed: in 2021, the Food Bank served <u>26%</u> of the entire population of Missoula County! And in 2022, the demand and need for the Food Bank has increased even more.

Please join us on Sunday, November 20, as we once again show our support for this important community organization.

A book discussion with Rev. Terri Love is the Way Holding on to Hope in Troubling Times

Perhaps you remember a certain sermon preached with humor, power, and grace at the royal wedding a few years ago. Remember? Of course, you do; that was Bishop Michael Curry! Everybody knows him, you say. The Rt. Rev. Michael Curry is the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, elected at General Convention in 2015 as the first African American to lead the denomination. He is a very spiritual man who brings Good News in a manner that can reach the masses and yet feel like he is talking just to you.

Bishop Curry is known for speaking about the power of Love. He recently published a book entitled "Love is the Way: Holding on to Hope in Troubling Times" that weaves together his understanding of God's love from years of preaching, prayer, singing, and daily reflection. It is easy to read and well worth the time to do so.

I will lead a small group in the discussion of this book on the four Monday evenings in November (7, 14, 21, 28). We will meet from 6:30 pm – 8 pm at the home of Sue Talbot, 69 Brookside Way, Missoula, MT 59802. I am opening this group to ten people

Community Ministries Bundles of Warmth travel from Diocesan Convention

With temperatures beginning to drop, our Poverello Center partners helped Diocesan Convention attendees to imagine walking alongside our neighbors living unsheltered. We took a two-pronged approach: gather warm blankets and clothes to share and gain a better understanding of Montanans of all ages who are living without permanent shelter.

Audrey Murray, Lucia Work, and Carla Mettling worked on a gallery walk of statistics, reflections, and communication ideas. Attendees then bundled weatherproof blankets, heatretaining ponchos, hats, socks, gloves, and metal water bottles, together with notes of encouragement – 135 bundles in all – that traveled to schools, libraries, parishes, and shelter programs across the state. Bundle items were purchased with the generosity of Bishop Marty, parishes, and delegates.

The morning after Convention, a young mom and her children on their way to school saw a person pushing a cart with their belongings. The children wondered if the person might be able to use the Bundle they had packed in their car. They pulled over, struck up a conversation, and the Bundle was received with a smile. Less than 24 hours....

When does Baptism take place at Holy Spirit?

Holy Baptism is full initiation by water and the Holy Spirit into Christ's Body the Church. Baptism takes place during the Easter Vigil service (Saturday evening, in April), and at a Sunday service about three times a year: the Day of Pentecost (the first Sunday in June this year), the Sunday after All Saints' Day (early November), and the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord (the first Sunday after Epiphany, in early January). Baptism may also take place when the bishop visits (in December this year), and on a Sunday during the summer on a date to be determined. The next date for Baptism will be at the bishop's visitation on December 4, at the 10:15 am service.

Stories from the border Hospitality at the border

March 2022. Ciudad Juarez. Father Hector, in collar, cross, and cowboy hat, greeted us at St. Matthias Church, where he extends the hospitality of Christ to migrants. To our humble amazement, the residents of St. Matthias, who had left everything in their flight to asylum, bestowed that Christian hospitality on us, serving food and stories.

In 2018, Father Hector arrived at crumbling, trash-filled St. Matthias with four screwdrivers, two crescent wrenches, one hammer, and a vision of a shelter where migrants would live as early Christians did. Today the shelter provides safety, rest, a certified school for children, vocational training, great haircuts, and clean, well-fitting clothing to migrants who arrive with nothing but blue pants and shirts issued at the US border. He guided us through immaculate chicken coops, pig pens, greenhouses, and a tilapia farm that provide income and food for the shelter. In the large community room, children attended classes. In the kitchen, silent, serious women stirred mahogany-colored sauce in an enormous pot. Politely refusing our

offer of help, they served us mole for lunch. The kitchen supervisor told us she fled violence in southern Mexico. She hopes to open a restaurant in El Paso.

After lunch we followed Father Hector across town to Holy Spirit Shelter and toured its cottage industry of sewing liturgical garments. Over café con leche, David and Keni told us of their harrowing trip to escape gang violence in El Salvador; their adorable daughter, Betsy Diana, blessed the visitors with hugs and Spanish lessons. Father Hector invited us to stay for a dinner of "very simple food." Very simple, yes, and indescribably delicious: broccoli, cauliflower, and turnip stew, refried beans, and exquisite tortillas. Father Hector offered his special habanero salsa from a huge jar.

We waited in line on the bridge a long time to cross the border back to St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, our home in El Paso. Plenty of time to talk and unwind. Back at St. Christopher's we went straight to bed, drained, weary, and in wonder of what we had seen and heard.
