HOLY SPIRIT EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Worship lies at the heart of the Christian life. It is in worship that we express our theology and define our identity. It is through encountering God within worship that we are formed and transformed as the people of God. One of the glories of the Episcopal Church is its liturgical worship. Liturgy refers to the patterns, forms, words, and actions through which public worship is conducted.

The people's responses are in **bold**.

This type of note, offering directions about the service, is called a "rubric," which comes from the Latin word rubrica (red)—referring to a time when these instructional notes were always written in red.

THE ENTRANCE RITE

When the service is accompanied by music, it often begins with an instrumental piece of music, during which the congregation can prepare for worship.



THE WORD OF GOD

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

The collect is the prayer appointed for each Sunday that "collects" or captures the theme of the day or season of the Church year. It summarizes the attributes of God as revealed in the scriptures for the day.

Celebrant The Lord be with you.People And also with you.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Almighty and everlasting God, you govern all things both in heaven and on earth: Mercifully hear the supplications of your people, and in our time grant us your peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

THE LESSONS

THE FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

This reading is typically from the Old Testament (Hebrew Scriptures) which Jesus knew and from which he often referred or quoted.

A Reading from the book of Deuteronomy, chapter 18, verses 15 through 20.

[Moses summoned all Israel and said to them,] ¹⁵"The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. ¹⁶This is what you requested of the LORD your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: 'If I hear the voice of the LORD my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die.' ¹⁷Then the LORD replied to me: 'They are right in what they have said. ¹⁸I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. ¹⁹Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. ²⁰But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die.'"

Reader The Word of the Lord.

THE PSALM

The psalms are prayers that Jesus used and cover every mood of humanity's relationship with God and one another.

Reader Our response to the first reading is Psalm 111. Please pray it with me.

PSALM: Psalm 111

¹Hallelujah!

I will give thanks to the LORD with my whole heart, * in the assembly of the upright, in the congregation.

²Great are the deeds of the LORD! *

they are studied by all who delight in them.

³His work is full of majesty and splendor, * and his righteousness endures forever.

⁴He makes his marvelous works to be remembered; * the LORD is gracious and full of compassion.

⁵He gives food to those who fear him; * he is ever mindful of his covenant.

⁶He has shown his people the power of his works * in giving them the lands of the nations.

⁷The works of his hands are faithfulness and justice; * all his commandments are sure.

⁸They stand fast for ever and ever, *

because they are done in truth and equity.

⁹He sent redemption to his people;

he commanded his covenant forever; *

holy and awesome is his Name.

¹⁰The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom; *

those who act accordingly have a good understanding;

his praise endures forever.

THE SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 8:1-13

This reading, taken from the New Testament, is typically from a letter (epistle) to the early Church, the Acts of the Apostles, or the Revelation to John.

A Reading from Paul's First Letter to the Church in Corinth, chapter 8, verses 1 through 13.

¹Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. ²Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; ³but anyone who loves God is known by him.

⁴Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." ⁵Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords—⁶yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.

⁷It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. ⁸"Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. ⁹But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. ¹⁰For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? ¹¹So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. ¹²But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. ¹³Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Mark 1:21-28

This reading is taken from one of the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John), which depict the life, teachings, death, resurrection and ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ. We stand for the Gospel reading to show the particular importance placed on Jesus' words and actions.

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark, chapter 1, verses

21 through 28.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

²¹[Jesus and his disciples] went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. ²²They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. ²³Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, ²⁴and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." ²⁵But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" ²⁶And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. ²⁷They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." ²⁸At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

THE SERMON

The Rev. Terri Ann Grotzinger

The sermon directly follows the Gospel because it is to be grounded in the scriptures. It illuminates the scriptural readings and relates them to daily life.

THE NICENE CREED

The word "creed" comes from the Latin "credo" for "I believe." First formulated at the Council of Nicaea in 325 AD and confirmed in 381 AD, the Nicene Creed is said at the Holy Eucharist and reflects what Christians believe regarding the relationship between the Father, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit: the Holy Trinity.

We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, seen and unseen.
We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven:
by the power of the Holy Spirit

he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again

in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified.

He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.



MEET THE NOMINEES FOR VESTRY

The members of Holy Spirit Episcopal Church will be electing four members to the Vestry at the Annual Meeting on January 31. Each will serve a three-year term. In order for you to know the people who have been nominated to the Vestry, the Nominating Committee would like to offer the following profiles:

JOHN CROWLEY: John was raised as a Catholic in Maine and became a member of the Episcopal faith in 1965. In 1973 John and his family moved to Missoula where he became the Missoula City-County Planning Director, and it was at that time that he began attending services at Holy Spirit.

Following a five-year term as Planning Director, John joined the Washington group of companies as the Director of Real Estate for Washington Development Company. In that capacity he was responsible for the management of company-owned real estate assets throughout the US and western Canada. John became the President of Washington Development Company and developed numerous real estate projects in Missoula and elsewhere.

After a 25-year career, John retired but quickly found retirement to be over-rated, and in 2008 he and a colleague formed a real estate brokerage firm specializing in commercial real estate sales and leasing. John is currently a Principal in that firm.

John previously served a three-year term on the Holy Spirit Vestry and a one-year term as Senior Warden. He is currently a member of the Holy Spirit Memorial Foundation Board.

NANCY ERREBO: In 1993, Nancy moved to Missoula, her old college town, and became a member of Holy Spirit Parish. She was drawn to the liturgy, the church calendar, the beauty of the sanctuary and music, and the open-minded inclusiveness of the parishioners. She has sung in the choir from the beginning.

Nancy started life in Denmark, Kansas, as a Danish Evangelical Lutheran. As a teenager and young adult in Minnesota, she was a Methodist. After graduating from the University of Montana, her 16-year teaching career began at Rocky Boy School and ended after five years as a sixth-grade teacher for Aramco Schools in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia. In 1990, Nancy completed a doctoral program in clinical psychology at the University of Denver. She worked as a psychologist for the Department of Veterans Affairs and in private practice. Nancy retired from the VA in 2014 and from private practice in 2018.

Single most of her life, work has been her focus. In retirement, Nancy is increasingly involved in Holy Spirit. Six years of Education for Ministry (EfM) have changed her life. Nancy serves as lector and intercessor, participates in book groups and community service, and was a delegate to the 2018 Diocesan Convention.

If elected to the Vestry, Nancy would be dedicated to the welfare of our parishioners, our commitment to end racism, and the challenge of the global pandemic, as well as ongoing budget and membership issues.

WARREN GARTNER: Warren grew up in Park Forest, Illinois where his family was active in Faith United Protestant Church. He attended the University of Illinois where he earned a BA in Zoology. Warren went on to Michigan State University where he earned a master's degree in Parks and Recreation Resources, specializing in Environmental Education. After college he moved to Michigan where he worked at an outdoor education center.

There Warren met Karen Simons who also served as part of the staff. Karen moved to Indianapolis to work at Conner Prairie, and Warren soon followed to take the position of Conservation Education Supervisor with the Indiana Division of Fish & Wildlife. They were married and raised their 2 sons, John and James, while in the Indianapolis area. They joined St. Christopher's Episcopal Church and were soon busy teaching Sunday School, reading lessons, serving on the Vestry, ushering, coordinating their community garden, developing a natural playground, etc.

Upon retirement, Karen and Warren decided to move to their favorite state, Montana. They visited Holy Spirit and were impressed with how active the church was in the community. They have enjoyed getting to know the Holy Spirit community and have made many new friends. Warren volunteers on the Social Concerns Committee, the Stewardship Committee, and the Creation Care Committee. He has helped with the Holiday Market, Blood Drive, Rummage Sale, book studies, Sunday Supper Club, and Habitat for Humanity.

Warren agreed to be a candidate for Holy Spirit's Vestry to continue the good work we are doing of spreading Christ's love to our parishioners, the Missoula area and beyond.

HOLLY SWARTZ: Holly's father was a Marine, so they moved across the country and her family attended Episcopal Churches. She was confirmed at St. James in Bozeman in 1964. They moved to Utah in 1965 and returned to Montana in 1968. Holly moved to Missoula the first time in 1968 as her father was transferred here by Allied Stores to be the Sporting Goods manager at the Missoula Mercantile. Her parents were parishioners at Holy Spirit, and Holly graduated from Hellgate High School and the University of Montana. She met Gary, her husband, as a freshman at UM, and they were married three years later by the Rev. Leigh Wallace. Gary's Army career moved them across the United States and Europe for 30 years. They returned home to Missoula in 2003.

Holly became a lay reader and chalice bearer for the first time at St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Hinesville, GA and also served on the Mission Council. She has been the president of three Episcopal Church Women's groups: first at St. Philip's in Hinesville, GA, second at St. Andrew's in Omaha, NE and the third at St. Andrew's in Lawton, OK. Holly has attended and led Bible studies throughout this time. She completed

Education for Ministry (EFM) in 2003 at St. Andrew's in Lawton, OK and has started it again this year. Holly has continued to be a lay reader/chalice bearer and usher through the years in GA, NE, OK, Germany, Belgium, and Missoula. She was on the Transition Committee for the Diocese of Montana from planning the farewell for Bishop Brookhart to the ordination of Bishop Marty Stebbins. Holly served on the Holy Spirit Vestry from 2006-2008.
