Our service schedule returns to in-person worship at 10:15 am on September 12 with a pre-recorded service available starting at 8 am on YouTube

Starting Sunday, September 12, we will have two Worship Services: a contemplative prerecorded online Liturgy of the Word service that will be on YouTube by 8 am; and an inperson, non-recorded Eucharistic service with music at 10:15 am. We will use a variety of liturgies available to us over a period of some weeks. The ongoing pandemic of Covid 19 and its variants requires many members to remain out of inperson gatherings. We hope the pre-recorded service, while not offering Eucharist, will still bring a more normal rhythm of Sunday morning worship for those unable to attend in person.

As of the writing of this article, the wearing of masks is required yet again for indoor gatherings at Holy Spirit. Thank you for your understanding as we move forward during these on-going pandemic times.

Holy Spirit is going solar!

Holy Spirit is partnering with NorthWestern Energy and SBS Solar for this project

As it says in Ecclesiastes 1:5, "The sun also rises, and the sun goes down, and hastens to the place where it arose." The sun cycle that marks our days will now also mark a new chapter for Holy Spirit Episcopal Church. Holy Spirit is going solar! Spurred by the offer of a \$40,000 grant from NorthWestern Energy, which would pay for almost 70 percent of the cost, the Vestry voted on August 11 to install solar panels on the parish hall roof. The array should substantially reduce electricity costs and take a major step toward sustainable, eco-friendly energy. The balance of the cost, about \$17,700, will come from an endowment established by former parishioner Mary Blair. SBS Solar of Missoula will install the 23kilowatt array by the end of October. The grant is contingent upon a technical review by NWE and a signed contract. Holy Spirit will undertake an education campaign, explaining how solar energy will be harnessed and used to power the church buildings.



Join us for an evening for Rio Grande Borderland Ministries

Migrant families at the U.S.-Mexico border live in inadequate and unsafe housing, leaving many children vulnerable to kidnapping by the drug cartels. An Episcopal diocese serving the borderlands of New Mexico and far West Texas works closely with the Anglican Diocese of Northern Mexico to support immigrants of all ages on both sides of the border. It keeps its mission non-political and focused on each person's humanity, rather than a divisive political debate. What, if anything, can an Episcopal parish in Missoula, Montana, do to help?

Come join members of the Social Concerns Committee on Thursday, September 16, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m., to enjoy some chili, tamales and Mexican beverages, (yes, that includes beer!) and hear via teleconference from representatives of the Rio Grande Borderland Ministries (RGBM) about its decades-long work with immigrants. They will answer questions and discuss ways that distant parishes like Holy Spirit can aid in this important work. People wishing to familiarize themselves beforehand with the RGBM can view its website at riograndeborderland.org.

The meal is free, compliments of the Social Concerns Committee, but we ask that people planning to attend please sign up by Sunday, Sept. 12, so we know how many diners to expect. There also will be a sign-up list for those parishioners who cannot attend the dinner but wish to participate in the presentation and discussion via Zoom. Folks interested in attending the event in person or via Zoom may also call the church office at (406) 542-2167 to sign up.

In addition to enjoying the tasty food and festive atmosphere while learning about RGBM's critical work, parishioners can buy raffle tickets for three prizes: a beautiful story cloth from Multicolores in Guatemala: a modern, migrant-focused icon from artist Kelly Latimore, who was recently featured in a Zoom discussion with Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, and one dozen of the evening's homemade tamales, prepared by a Mexican cook in the Bitterrroot. Raffle tickets will be available for sale in the parish hall after Sunday services and at the dinner. The price is \$5 for one ticket and \$20 for five.

The focus of the evening with the RGBM representatives will be on meeting people's needs, not critiquing or advocating for particular policies. Come join us on Thursday, Sept. 16, to explore ways that each of us can support a sister diocese in the borderlands and see and serve Christ in all persons. Hope to see you there in person or via Zoom!

Welcome Missoula Christian Montessori School!

We are happy to welcome the Missoula Christian Montessori School, serving up to fifteen children ages 6 years - 12 years, to lease a part of our buildings for the next year or two. The Vestry supports using our buildings more, especially those spaces that we use very irregularly during the week and which fit within our Vision and Mission. The Montessori School plans to build on recently purchased property and needed a place to meet for a few years until their new school campus is completed.

The school is run under the direction of Anna Sanor, an experienced Christian Montessori School teacher and Director. Working with Rev. Gretchen Strohmaier, the Vestry, and me, we have arranged for the school to have a designated two-thirds of the large room downstairs in the Parish Hall with access directly from outside (where bicycles are often parked). The Church School will retain the other third of the space as well as all the classrooms and the large area adjacent to the classrooms. There will be a cooking class from 1-3 pm on Mondays in the kitchen, some use of the out of doors area for such things as dance, and the teachers will have use of the Tower Room as a teachers' lounge during weekdays. Our mutual desire is to respect one another's needs and areas, and the lease reflects such specifics within it. More to come about all of this, but most importantly we celebrate their presence with us for a time!

Opportunities to cultivate, challenge and live our faith

Join us as we celebrate the Season of Creation this fall

From September 1 to October 4, Christians are called to celebrate the good gift of creation. This global celebration began in 1989 as a day of prayer for creation. Now, as a liturgical season, it is embraced by a wide, ecumenical community.

In Genesis God set a dome over the earth. The word *dome* is where we get words such as domicile and domestic. In other words, God puts us all—all people, all life-under the same domed roof. We all belong to the house of God. The goal of this season of creation is to assist Christians in recognizing that all life—human, plant and animal—is an equal part of God's beloved community, though each has a different role to play. We also recognize that our shared home is now in danger because of greed, exploitation, disrespect, disconnection and systematic degradation. The whole creation is still crying out. Since the dawn of the Industrial Revolution the

geography where we recognize God's creative power has continued to shrink. We have forgotten that we all live in the household of God. It is the hope and prayer of the organizers of this season of creation that all Christians everywhere may recognize their interconnectedness with all of creation and work to renew life—all life—on this planet. 

Remembering George Stewart

This old photo may look familiar. It hangs on the wall in the church office. George Stewart, appointed by Bishop Tuttle, served a number of congregations in western Montana, visiting Hamilton, Stevensville, Missoula and even Thompson Falls periodically, before being assigned to Holy Spirit as the first resident priest in 1877.

Rev. Gretchen dug into George's history after discovering that George and his wife, Isabell, were the first owners of her home built on Pine Street in 1895. As it turns out, she discovered that she and George share a number of things in common. She has now established contact with some of George's relatives who live in the Seattle area.

George and Isabell Stewart and some of their children are buried in the Missoula City Cemetery, but George does not have a headstone. Out of respect for George's ministry and commitment to the Church we will be using some memorial funds designated by the family of Shirley Green to have a headstone placed on George's grave. Look for more details to come to learn about an opportunity to visit the cemetery and participate in a service to honor George.

Cross scheduling website are set aside for Power Red donations. Have you ever wondered what a Power Red donation is? At our February blood drawing, Gary Swartz signed up for a Power Red donation. This is his experience:

"As a long-time blood donor, I came to Holy Spirit last February ready to give a pint of blood. When asked about becoming a Power Red donor I had to be told what it entailed.

It sounded easy enough, and I had the extra 30 minutes to spare. The hook up was like a regular blood donation, but because they were taking two units of red blood cells, they would be replacing some of my blood mixed with saline as it was pumped back into my arm. The saline solution, being at room *temperature, was cool and produced a* refreshing feeling. Before too long I was *done and felt good about helping twice* as many people with the Power Red program. I would have to wait almost four months to donate again, but in September I plan to continue to be a Power Red donor."

As Gary notes, a Power Red donation allows you to safely donate two units of red blood cells during one donation. The Power Red is for donors

with type O, A negative or B negative blood types. With just a little extra time at your appointment—it takes about 1.5 hours—you can donate more red cells and increase your impact on patients in need. There are a few special requirements. Power Red donors can donate every 112 days, up to 3 times/year. In addition, male donors must be at least 5'1" tall and weigh 130 lbs. or more. Female donors must be at least 5'5" tall and weigh 150 lbs. or more. And, as with any blood donation, you must be in good health and feeling well.

Please consider being a Power Red donor. You will double your impact! See you at the blood drive on September 23, 2021.
